## 55. The bid and the beautiful

After 24 boards in the 36-board final of the Alt Invitational, held in April and organized by bid72, bridge 24 and netbridgeonline, together with BBO (Bridge Base Online), De Botton (Janet de Botton, Thomas Charlsen, Jason Hackett, Thor Erik Hoftaniska, Alexander Hydes, Artur Malinowski) led Street (Paul Street, Kamel Fergani, Nicolas L'Ecuyer, Ron Pachtman, Fred Pollack, Piotr Zatorski) by 52 Imps to 29. DE BOTTON won Session 3 by 25-10 and the match by 77-39.

With South the dealer, neither side vulnerable, and with the opponents passing throughout, how would you and partner bid these cards:

With trumps 2-2 and clubs 4-2, there was nothing to the play. Both Wests led a trump. The easy line is to win the heart, cash the cross to dummy with a trump and lead a low club, ruffing. Then claim 13 tricks.
2. With South the dealer, only East-West vulnerable, and with the opponents passing throughout, how would you and partner bid these cards:

This is sensible:

(1) How many spades do you have?
(2) 3 spades, 4 clubs and 5 diamonds

With a minimum, unbalanced opening, it is preferable to raise to $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ at once, even with just three trumps. With a weak hand, 6-9 (10) points, responder passes and hopefully succeeds. If responder has prospects for game, responder asks with 2NT. Bidding 3 (weak) or 4^ (stronger) show four trumps. Any other bid shows only three spades. South's denies four spades and shows the shape of the hand. Since South is marked with a minimum opening and shortage in hearts, North jumps to $5 \downarrow$, clearly the best spot on the hand.

If you bid $1 \star: 1 \boldsymbol{\wedge}, 2 \boldsymbol{a}$ and responder bids $2 \star$ or $3 \boldsymbol{*}$ next, you are showing more than your hand is worth by giving delayed spade support now.

Note: Both Souths raised to $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$. The play was identical at both tables. West led a heart. East won and returned a spade, 49 from South. West ruffed and brought back a heart. South ruffed and drew trumps, +400 , no swing.
