## 77. Valuation consideration

Today's deals are from Round 5 of Alt-Invitational III, organized by bid72, bridge 24 and netbridgeonline, together with BBO (Bridge Base Online). These were the teams:

What would you do as South with:

This is a mildly surprising question. You might be thinking, 'Hey, hang on, why didn't I bid a natural, nonforcing 2NT immediately over 2e?' For the players who passed, did 2NT have a conventional meaning (a heart raise), did they think the hand was not worth 2 NT or were they frightened of being penalized if they bid 2 NT ?

After the auction given, ROSENTHAL was +110 when South bid $2 \uparrow(? ?)$, all pass. BLASS's South bid 2NT and North $3 N T$, all pass. West led the 5 , nine, queen. East returned the $\$ 10$, ace. South played $\$ 5$, jack, ace, and finessed the VQ . East won and cashed the $\&$. South claimed the rest, ten tricks, +630 and +11 Imps .

DE BOTTON had the 1 : 2e : Pass : Pass, Double : Pass : 2NT : Pass, 3NT, all pass auction. The play began 5 , nine, king, club return to A, diamond to $\star$, heart finesse. East won and returned a heart. The run of the red suits squeezed East and South ended with 11 tricks, +660 .

STREET North-South:

For most pairs, South's double would promise 4+ spades. East led the K . North won, crossed to the A and finessed in hearts. East won and cashed the Q . North claimed 11 tricks, +660 , no swing.

DONNER North-South had the usual auction, with South passing over $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ and ending in 3NT. West led the 5 . South made 11 tricks, +660.

GUPTA North-South: North opened $1 \boldsymbol{k}$ (artificial, strong). East bid 2\&. South doubled. After Pass from West, North bid $2 \vee$ : Pass : 3NT, all pass. West led the South made 10 tricks, +630, 1 Imp away.

BRIDGE SCANNER North-South: $1 *$ (artificial, strong) : 2 : Pass : Pass, $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ : Pass : 3NT, all pass. West led the 10 , ace. South made 10 tricks, +630 .

RUSSIA North-South: North opened 1NT : South 3^ (asking for a 5-card major), North 3 (5 hearts) : South 3NT, all pass. East led the $\&$ (promising the $\kappa$ ). North won, crossed to the $\star$ A and took the heart finesse. East won and switched to the $\mathbf{\Delta}$. North made 11 tricks, +660 , +1 Imp.

You are the dealer, neither side vulnerable. What would you do with:

If you count losers, you have six losers and so seven playing tricks. That would prompt a $4 \boldsymbol{4}$ opening. Those who fancy 7-4 patterns would also open 4•. Those of a conservative nature might open 34.

IN ALT III, five opened 4a, two opened 3a and one opened $2 \boldsymbol{a}$.

Where West opened $3 \star$, North bid $3 N T$, all pass. At one table it went $\uparrow$ A lead; $\uparrow 5$ switch, queen, ace; $\star A ; \uparrow K$
 West took the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ and returned a club. North made 2 spades, 3 diamonds and 3 clubs, one down, -50 . At the
 still had two spades to lose, three down, $-500,11$ Imps to ROSENTHAL.

Some play the double of 4a as penalties. Others play it as takeout. Even when the double is for takeout, it shows a very strong hand, since it commits the partnership to the 5-level if partner bids. Therefore one often leaves the double in for penalties with a balanced hand.

The bidding and play were almost identical in DE BOTTON vs STREET with 3^ : 3NT, all pass, one off, EastWest +50 , and 44 : Double, all pass, three off, North-South +500 and 11 Imps to STREET.

The board was flat at North-South +500 for $4 \boldsymbol{~}$ : Double, all pass, at both tables in DONNER vs GUPTA.

RUSSIA North-South:

(1) Lebensohl, asking partner to bid $3 \boldsymbol{\&}$. South was intending to bail out in $3 \boldsymbol{*}$ over $3 \boldsymbol{\&}$.

West led $\wedge \mathrm{K}$, winning, and switched to the $\uparrow 9$, ace. After cashing the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$, South played the $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$. East won and returned the $\downarrow \mathrm{J}$, queen. East won the $\downarrow 7$ exit with the $\varangle 8$ and cashed two hearts for one light, East-West +100 .

BRIDGE SCANNER North-South:

 to the $\$ 10$, ace. Declarer discarded the $\$ 8$ on dummy’s $\leftrightarrows$, as East ruffed. East cashed three hearts to take 5 doubled three down, East-West +500 and +9 Imps to RUSSIA.

South opens 1NT (15-17 points). North bids $2 \boldsymbol{*}$, Stayman. South bids $2 \downarrow$, no major. North jumps to 6 NT, all pass. West leads the $\$ 7$ : nine - three - queen. South plays the $\$ 4$ : three - jack . . . which card do you play?
