## 79. Minor decisions

Today's deals are from Round 7 of Alt-Invitational III, organized by bid72, bridge 24 and netbridgeonline, together with BBO (Bridge Base Online). These were the teams:

With both sides vulnerable, Partner opens 2NT. Pass on your right. What would do with:

* Q9865
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There are various methods for bidding after a 2 NT opening. Old-style was $3 \boldsymbol{e}$ Stayman, $3 \uparrow / 3 \mathrm{C} / 3$ all 5 -card suits. Modern style includes 3 -card major Stayman, $3 \diamond / 3 \downarrow$ transfers and $3 \boldsymbol{\wedge}=5$ spades, 4 hearts. Others
 spades, 4 hearts, no slam interest and $2 \mathrm{NT}: 3 \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}, 3 \boldsymbol{4}$ with 5 spades, 4 hearts and slam interest. With 4 spades, 5 hearts, you bid 2NT: 3४, 3ヶ:3^.

The above hand has 9 HCP, not primarily a slam hand opposite $20-22$ points, but what if a minor-suit fit exists? Now there certainly could be a slam. You can bid 2NT : 3\& (do you have a 4+ minor?). If partner bids 3NT, you pass. If partner shows a minor, you can head for slam.

BLASS North-South bid Pass : 2NT, 3a (minors) : 4e (agreeing clubs), $4 \boldsymbol{4}$ (cue) : 4NT, all pass. Was North asking for key cards? Did North think that South lacked diamond control. North made 12 tricks, N-S +690 .

STREET North-South bid Pass : 2NT, 3 (minors), 4\& : 4 (cue), 4NT : 5 (0 or 3 key cards), 6NT, all pass. East led the $\vee \mathrm{Q}$. North won, cashed the K and knocked out the $\mathrm{A}, 12$ tricks, $+1440,12$ Imps to STREET.


BRIDGE SCANNER North-South bid Pass : 2NT, 3\& (looking for a 5-3 spade fit) : 3NT (no 4-card or 5-card major), $4 \boldsymbol{e}$ (five clubs) : 4 (cue, no diamond control), 4 (spade control and diamond control) : 6\& all pass. $\bullet$ A lead, followed by $\$ 3$, 12 tricks, North-South +1370 .

ROSENTHAL North-South bid Pass : 2NT, 3\& (minors) : 4e, 4ヶ (cue) : 4NT, 5\& (0 or 3 key cards): 6e, all pass. e lead, 12 tricks, North-South +1370 , no swing.

The board was also flat in $6+1370$ in DE BOTTON vs GUPTA.
DONNER North-South bid to 6\&, +1370, after North opened 1\&, artificial, strong, in third seat, East overcalled $1 \vee$ and South jumped to $3 \boldsymbol{e}$.

At the other table, RUSSIA had an accident. North-South bid Pass : 2NT, 3e : 3NT (no major), 4叉, all pass! West led the $\uparrow 10$ and South finished two down, -200 and 17 Imps to DONNER.

As you can see, $7 \star$ is laydown and was reached three times. Four pairs played in $6 *$ and one saved in 6 doubled.

After the problem auction, DONNER West bid 4NT, a sensible choice. East bid 5^, 2 key cards plus the $\downarrow$ (the diamond length compensated for the $\uparrow$ ). West bid $6 \mathfrak{*}$, no key cards missing, interested in $7 \uparrow$. East bid $7 \star$, all pass, East-West +2140 .

With RUSSIA East-West it began 1e (artificial, strong) : Pass : 2 ( $5+$ diamonds, $8+$ points, game-force) : 4 and also ended in 7ヶ, +2140, no swing.

GUPTA East-West reached $7 \uparrow+2140$, after West opened with a strong $1 \boldsymbol{*}$. With DE BOTTON East-West, the


BLASS East-West bid to 6 after an auction almost the same as DE BOTTON's sequence. STREET also ended in $6 \star$ after South overcalled $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, no swing.

ROSENTHAL East-West bid to $6 \uparrow,+1390$, after South came in with $3 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ over East’s response. At the other table, with BRIDGE SCANNER East-West, the auction was more exciting:

West led the A and switched to the $\uparrow$. East won and shifted to the $\uparrow 5$ (high-hate): nine - king - four. West returned the $\vee 7$. East took the $\vee$ A and returned the $\downarrow 2$, suit-preference for clubs. West ruffed with the $\downarrow A$, cashed the K and played the 2 : nine $-2-4$. Down to only trumps, South played the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ and East scored the $\uparrow$ Q to take 6
