After ruffing AQ, West switches to 10: eight – king – four and in due course, East makes a trump trick for one down, East-West +50. As the cards lie, it makes no difference which card West plays at trick 3. South is bound to lose a spade and a heart for one down. Still, personal pride demands you ruff QQ at trick 3 and play a spade.

At the other table, it went  $1 \ge 1 \le 2$ , Pass :  $2 \le 2$ , all pass. West led  $\ge 10$ . East won with the  $\ge Q$ , followed by  $\ge A$  and  $\ge K$ , West discarding  $\ge 2$ . East switched to  $\le 3$ . South made 8 tricks, +110 and +4 Imps.

West leads the ♦A: three – jack (singleton or discouraging) – two.
 West switches to the ♥3: jack – five – two.

3. Declarer plays dummy's ♦7: eight – nine – ten.

4. West continues with the  $\mathbf{\bullet}6$ : eight – four – nine.

5. Declarer plays  $\clubsuit$ 4: three – ace – seven

6. and the  $\bigstar$ 2: nine –  $\checkmark$ 10 –  $\checkmark$ K.

7. West plays the  $\diamond K: \diamond 5 - \diamond 4 - \diamond 5$ 


8. and the  $\diamond Q$ :  $\bigstar 6$  from dummy . . . which card do you play as East?

This time it was essential to do the right thing:

After the first seven tricks as above, these cards remained:



When West led the  $\diamond Q$ , the  $\diamond 6$  was ditched from dummy. East ruffed and played a top club. South ruffed and finessed the  $\diamond J$ , but could not avoid a spade loser for one down, East-West +50.

If East fails to ruff the  $\diamond Q$ , West is left on lead with only spades left. Whether West plays the  $\pm 10$  or lower, South will duck in dummy, win with the  $\pm Q$  and finesse the  $\pm J$ .

Double dummy, South could have made  $2\Psi$  (win the second heart lead and play the  $\Psi$ A), but naturally could not believe that West had bared the  $\Psi$ K. South presumed West had started with  $\pm$ K,  $\Rightarrow$ A-K-Q and only two hearts, while East had  $\Psi$ K-x-x-x and  $\pm$ K-Q. If so, South planned to collect two heart tricks (already in by trick 4),  $\pm$ A, club ruff, spade finesse, club ruff,  $\pm$ A and the  $\Psi$ A for eight tricks.

Note Jodi Tutty's neat play as West, playing two low hearts from K-6-3, leaving the ♥K singleton.

East led the  $\forall 4$ : two – king – eight. West cashed  $\diamond A$ ,  $\diamond K$ , followed by the  $\forall 3$ . South overtook the  $\forall J$  with the  $\forall Q$  and cashed the  $\forall A$ . Neither the subsequent play nor the defence was flawless. North finished with eight tricks, +470 and +11 Imps.
