After the auction above, West led A, K and 6. May Sakr (S) ruffed and set about setting up the clubs: J to A, K, pitching the 2, and the 5: J - A - 10. She continued with K: two – three – five and the 8: six – seven – 3. The next spade to dummy's Q drew West's last trump and declarer had the rest, +650.

The defence could have defeated the contract. West needed to play a heart at tricks 1, 2 or 3. If declarer ruffs, dummy's club length is nullified. If it starts A, K, heart switch and South discards dummy's 10, East can win with a top heart and must continue with the other top heart to beat $4\frac{1}{2}$.

At the other table, it went $1 \neq : 1 \triangleq : 2 \triangleq$ (shows diamonds) : $2 \triangleq$, $3 \blacklozenge : Pass : Pass : 3 \clubsuit$, all pass. The play started the same way, but South ruffed two hearts in dummy and made 9 tricks, +140 but -11 Imps.

PEPSI won Set 1 40-10 and lost Set 2 by 13-29 but still led by 53-39.

South opened 1, North bid 1, and with no East-West bidding, South has reached 6. West leads the $\forall J$ (underleading): two – four – ace. All follow to the A. Plan the play.

Decide on your plan before going further.

In yesterday's second problem, South also reached $6 \clubsuit$. West leads the $\blacklozenge J$: four – ace - nine. East switches to the $\blacktriangledown 4$: ace – nine – two. Plan the play after that start.

West led the \bullet J. East won and switched to the \bullet 4. Marc Bompis (S) took the ace and, with the diamond position secure, he ruffed a heart, crossed to the \bullet A, ruffed a heart, cashed the \bullet K, returned to hand with a diamond and the \bullet Q drew the last trump. The other heart loser went on dummy's second spade winner, +1370.

West led the $\blacktriangleleft J$, underleading. With the $\blacklozenge A$ at large, the situation was more precarious. May Sakr (S) took the $\blacklozenge A$, cashed the $\blacklozenge A$, continued with the $\blacklozenge 7$ to the $\blacklozenge A$ and ruffed a low spade. Then came the $\blacklozenge Q$ and the $\blacklozenge 7$ to the $\blacklozenge K$, followed by the $\blacklozenge K$, discarding the $\blacklozenge 9$, and another spade ruff. After the $\blacklozenge K$, taken by the ace, South could claim with the $\blacklozenge Q$ in hand and the last trump and two spade winners in dummy.
