
174. Up and down in 3NT #2


Dealer West: Nil vulnerable



West leads the $\clubsuit 8$: ace – five – seven. Declarer plays the $\spadesuit 3$: seven – ten – jack. West returns the $\spadesuit 3$: king – jack – nine. South continues with the $\spadesuit 4$ from dummy: ace – queen – two. What would you play at trick 5?

Today's deal comes from the semi-final match between KOLESNIK (Finn Kolesnik– Jacob Freeman, Bob Hamman – Peter Weichsel, Bart Bramley – Kit Woolsey) and SPECTOR (Warren Spector – Gavin Wolpert, Kevin Bathurst – John Hurd, Vincent Demuy – John Kranyak) in the 2020 North America Online Teams.


Board 8: Dealer West: Nil vulnerable



The early play was also the same: \$8 lead (not keen on clubs), taken by the ace. The \$3 went to the ten and jack. West played the \$3, won by the \$K. South continued with the \$4 from dummy: ace – queen – two. Wolpert (E) figured that South would always have an entry if South began with four clubs, but if South had started with only three clubs, South would have no entry to hand, even if South had the \$Q but not the \$A. East therefore returned the \$10, taken by the \$Q.

Declarer cashed the $\clubsuit6: •2 - •5 - •4$. Declarer played the •K from dummy: seven $-\sin - \sec$. West exited with the $\clubsuit5$. Declarer had lost three tricks so far. Dummy was down to ♠K-8-6 •J-8-5. If declarer won with the ♠K, West would win the next spade and cash the •Q for one down. In practice, South covered the ♠5 with the ♠6, winning, and cashed the ♠K and ♠8. When declarer exited from dummy with a diamond, West won two diamond tricks for one down, East-West +50.

At the other table, after ♣8 lead, taken by the ace, the ♠3 to the ten and jack, the ♣3, won by the ♣K and the ♠4 from dummy: ace – queen – two, Bramley (E) switched to the ♥2 at trick 5. Kranyak (S) inserted the ♥10, winning. Then came the ◆4: queen – king – two. Declarer cashed the ♠K and ♠6, followed by the ♠K. When he exited from dummy with the ♠8, West won and cashed the ◆A. South made the last two tricks whether West played a diamond or a heart, North-South +400, 10 Imps to SPECTOR.

At the halfway mark, SPECTOR led KOLESNIK by 72 Imps to 39.
