

The second semi-final in ALT MIXED III, an online event organized by bid72 and netbridge.online and held on BBO, was between second qualifier, APRICOTS (France: Irene Baroni, Thomas Bessis, Pierre Franceschetti, Cedric Lorenzini, Hilda Seton, Joanna Zochowska), who had won their quarter-final by 88.1 Imps to 37, and third qualifier DONNER (USA: Per-Ola Cullin, Gary Donner, Geir Helgemo, Jessica Larson, Marion Michielsen, Cecilia Rimstedt), who had won their quarter-final narrowly, 55.1 Imps to 53.



North for APRICOTS bid  $2\clubsuit$ , eminently sensible to seek a spade fit. That would be particularly good if South is able to show a 5-card spade suit.

When South bid 2♥ (four hearts), as in the auction at the top of the page, North bid 3♣, natural and forcing. As 3♣ might be based on only a 5-card suit, South bid 3NT to show a doubleton club. North then jumped to 6NT. As North-South have 15 winners (16 with spades 3-3), the 6NT bid fell short of the optimal spot. The auction was fine as far as it went it just did not go far enough. North should bid 4♣ to set clubs and start cue-bidding.


After 5NT,  $6 \blacklozenge$ , North can count on 6 clubs tricks (unless they are 5-0), three diamonds once South is known to have  $\blacklozenge A$  and  $\blacklozenge K$  (as South has shown a doubleton club, South should not have  $\blacklozenge A$ -K doubleton),  $\blacktriangledown A$  and 3 spades, as South has shown the  $\blacklozenge A$ .

For 6NT, APRICOTS North-South scored 1470. At the other table, DONNER North-South were not on the same wavelength, but they survived:

I would have said '7NT is a macho bid' except that 7NT was bid by the distaff member of the partnership. Can 'macho bid' also be feminine?
