 North-South pair played in $5 \vee$ undoubled and 12 were doubled, $5 \vee \times 4,6 \vee \times 6$ and $7 \vee \times 2$.

Venice Cup (women's Teams): Three matches were flat, two in 5 doubled -300 and one in $4+710 / 5+710$. There was one 9-Imp swing ( $54+710$ vs $5 \uparrow$ doubled -300 ), two 14 -Imp swings $(6+1370$ vs $5 \uparrow$ doubled -300
