281. Ruffing to success with Tim



Dealer South: Both vulnerable



West leads the \bullet J: six – three (low-like) – five. West continues with the \bullet 10: eight – four – \bullet 2. Declarer plays the \bullet A: \bullet 2 – \bullet 4 – \bullet 6. Plan the play.

This was the full deal:



Tim: 'Declarer continued by playing a low heart to dummy's ace to ruff dummy's last diamond. Next came the ace of clubs, followed by the king of hearts. After ruffing the nine of hearts successfully in dummy, declarer led a low club to the jack and king.' This was the position:



Tim: 'Declarer exited with a club to West's queen and East threw the ◆A. West exited with a heart and declarer threw dummy's club, while East had to ruff. As declarer threw a club under East's ◆9, East was endplayed and had to lead away from the queen of trumps. Declarer claimed the last two tricks and the contract, making five trumps, two hearts, a heart ruff and two clubs.'

'You should note that East could not have profited from ruffing the third round of clubs. In that case, all declarer would have lost would have been two trumps and one diamond.
