$\star 10$, taken by $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$. $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ cashed; $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$ : two - three - four; 甲A; 『K; East pitched a club on the fourth heart, ruffed by South who cashed the Q . East made 10 tricks, +420 .

At the six BBO tables where South opened 1 $\boldsymbol{*}$, one North bid $2 \boldsymbol{*}$, one bid $4 \boldsymbol{*}$ and four bid $5 \boldsymbol{*}$. My choice would have been $4 \boldsymbol{*}$. That allows partner to save in 5 or to pass or double and defend against their contract.

West led the $\vee$ : four - queen - three. East switched to the $Q$ : ace - three - five. South cashed the $\vee$ A and ruffed the $\vee$ with the $\boldsymbol{\sim}$. Next came the $\uparrow$ : jack - nine - two. What would you play as East at trick 6 ?
