

# 324. Stopping short

This was yesterday's problem:

Dealer West : North-South vulnerable

There is a general principle that if you have the values for a 1NT overcall, but you do not have a stopper in opener's suit, then you should start with a takeout double. On that basis, with the hand above, North should double 1♠. Of course, no one can promise you that this will turn out well, but also the worst need not happen. You cannot go through your bridge life with fear and anxiety as your primary emotions.

Today's deal arose in the 2017 Spingold (USA K-O Open Teams) semi-final between [LAVAZZA](#) and [SCHWARTZ](#).

When the opponents have found a fit at the 2-level and there are two passes to you, it usually pays you to compete. It is not certain that North-South have an 8-card heart fit, but it is likely.

What should East do? I'd vote for 2♣. Having shown the clubs on the previous round, partner should not expect more than 2-card support now if you are playing 5-card majors. A takeout double would work on the actual deal. West would definitely rebid 2♠. West would have no trouble making 2♣.

Against 2♥, West began with ♠A, ♠K, ♠Q: five – ♦3 – ♥4. South played ♦A, ♦K, ♠7: ♥9 – ♥10 and ruffed the ♦8 with the ♥Q. South ruffed the ♦J later with the ♥A for nine tricks, North-South +140.

The play followed similar lines to the play at the other table. South ruffed two diamonds high in dummy for 9 tricks, no swing.

When the deal was replayed in a game on BBO:

West	North	East	South
1♠	Dble	1NT <sup>(1)</sup>	2♥

(1) Natural, not forcing

The play went as at the other tables, with two diamonds ruffed high in dummy. A trump switch at trick 2 might hold declarer to eight tricks, although after ♥A, ♦A, ♦K, ♥3 to hand, South can play the ♦J to pin East's remaining diamond and still come to nine tricks.

So, three out of three Norths made a takeout double over 1♠, but only one East competed against 2♥. Given the favourable vulnerability it certainly looks attractive for East to find a second bid.
