

The heart lead was essential. Joel Wooldridge, South, took the 
▼A, drew trumps and played a diamond. There was no way to avoid losing a diamond and a heart, one down, East-West +50.

USA2 was North-South in the auction at the top of the page.

Johan Sylvan, West for Sweden, led the ♥8. With North advertising a void in clubs, a club lead held little interest.

It also followed that North would have long diamonds and that strongly argues against a trump lead, which could see



West had it easier to find the heart lead here. He led the ♥9 and in due course South was one down, East-West +50, no swing.

Leaping Michaels is a very useful way to show a 2-suiter after a weak-two opening. The downside is that you cannot jump to 4♣ or 4♦ to show a strong 1-suiter, but those hands can start with a takeout double and bidding the 1-suiter next. What should North do if you do not play Leaping Michaels? Your partnership needs some agreements here. What would  $(2^{\blacktriangledown})$ :  $4^{\blacktriangledown}$  show?

Bidding 3♦, not forcing, does not do the North hand justice. You will survive a takeout double on the actual hand, but it might not work out so well opposite other South hands.



The good news was that East led a diamond and West ruffed. The bad news was that after that lead there was no more defence. West returned a club, ruffed. North could draw trumps, set up the diamonds with a ruff, discard a heart loser in the South hand and ruff his own heart loser for twelve tricks, +1210, 15 Imps to Poland.
